It was fitting that just days after "No Kings Day," our Green Valley Branch had the opportunity to learn about the efforts of ACLU (American Civil Liberties Union) Arizona at our October general membership meeting. Victoria López, Executive Director, and Katelynn Contreras, Policy Strategist at ACLU Arizona, presented the mission of ACLU and issues that they are currently addressing.

We may be most familiar with ACLU's successes through litigation. However, they also are actively working to influence policy and engage communities to protect civil rights, and "liberties and dignity of all Arizonans." Issues they address include immigrants' rights, abortion access, criminal justice reform and LGBTQ+ rights. Because Arizona is a border state, they work to hold Customs and Border Patrol and other federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies accountable and address the human rights abuses found at the border and across our state.

Public Policy



We need your help. The Department of Education (DOE) has proposed a regulation [34 CFR Part 75] whose purpose is to "provide a common foundation and shared conception of this more perfect union" by "transmitting to all American students a shared understanding of our political, economic, intellectual and cultural history." The DOE also announced a partnership with a group of 40 conservative organizations to form the America 250 Civics Education Coalition, with a goal of creating patriotic civic materials and programming in celebration of the 250th

anniversary of the United States.

To put this in perspective, the DOE is prohibited by law from exercising "any direction, supervision or control over the curriculum, program or instruction...or over the selection of library resources, textbooks or other printed or published instructional materials by any institution or school system" [20 USC1232a]

This regulation is not yet law. Public comment ended October 17, after which the DOE is required to consider the comments before issuing a final regulation. The final regulation will be forwarded to Congress, which has 60 legislative or session days to react.

The regulation does not become law if a simple majority of Congress disapproves of it. Email or call your representatives. Let them know that you want them to file a joint resolution of disapproval of 34 CFR Part 75.



We advocate for strong public education, equitable access to higher education, civil-rights enforcement, economic security for women and families, and voting rights — core values that transcend party labels."

Community Outreach Spotlight: St. Andrew's Children's Clinic

For about 50 years, the St. Andrew's Children's Clinic in Nogales has provided free specialized medical care to children living in Mexico who can't get - or afford - the care they need in their home



country. It would have been over 50 years, but the clinic was forced to shut down during the Covid 19 pandemic and is currently working to rebuild both their clientele and volunteer staff.

Originally held in the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales (hence the name of the program), after the pandemic, the church was no longer able to accommodate the clinic at the church location, and after a dicey restart, the staff was able to acquire a permanent location at 969 W. Country Club Drive in Nogales, Arizona.

The St. Andrew's Children's Clinic is a non-denominational, non-profit, organization with a volunteer professional health care staff. The staff sees approximately 225 to 250 children on the first Thursday of each month except July, treating health needs related to cerebral palsy, spina bifida, blindness, hearing issues, club foot, brittle bone disease,

and other conditions requiring nutritional and speech therapy assistance. Every October, in cooperation with Children's Surgery International, approximately 50-60 children have cleft palate/cleft lip surgery in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico.

Many of the children who visit the Clinic travel by bus from Mexico's interior – a long ride to the Clinic and, seemingly, longer ride home. Our AAUW Green Valley branch members make 80 lunches each month on the day before the Clinic to distribute to the children, so they'll have something to eat on the ride back. In addition to a ham and cheese sandwich, we provide the children with a juice box, a granola bar, a washed apple, and a bottle of water.

The sign-up sheets for future lunch programs are available at each meeting. Please volunteer about 45 minutes of your time to help make lunches when you can (and PLEASE, when you do sign up, make sure you put it on your calendar!).

We are touring the clinic facilities on November 6. See details below.

Several members of the AAUW Green Valley Branch toured the **Sahuarita Food Bank and Resource Center** recently. Besides the food distribution program, they learned that the Center offers many other services, including cooking, English language, and GED classes.

The Center has a mobile unit that delivers food and classes to rural areas and is offering a program that teaches students how to establish and run a food truck. Childcare and parenting classes are also available. A new class recently started in welding, a trade that is in high demand.

The program uses state-of-the-art equipment to simulate real welding situations. The students learn on the machines before doing regular in-person welding at an off-site location. Both men and women have enrolled and there is a waiting list. Members were impressed with the breadth of services offered right in their community.
