And in those roles, I was often responsible for membership recruitment and retention. There was a common phrase in all the organizations: **members are our greatest asset**. I remembered that truism when I attended our branch's New Member Tea last month. The gathering was organized by Alice Sowards, membership vice president, and Bev Peake, membership vice president-elect, who opened her home for the event. They hosted eight of our ten new members along with current members and board members.

What was special about this event for me was that I got to meet and talk with some of our new members. But also, it was wonderful to see how engaged everyone was. There were lively conversations and interesting observations and enthusiasm. Marie Cory, former co-president and Honored Member, recounted the history and the importance of our Keeping Girls in School initiative. The book groups, our St. Andrew's Children's Clinic support project, and Needles and More—all were noted. And all members, especially the new members, were encouraged not only to participate in Interest Groups, but to propose ideas for new groups.

November Meeting Recap

We had 45 members and 3 guests attending our November 18 general meeting. Unfortunately, our scheduled speaker was unable to attend due to a COVID diagnosis. Thanks to the generosity and experience of our membership, we were treated to two delightful and informative talks.



Member **Judi Brauns** told us about her experience as an ELL (English Language Learner) teacher, working with children speaking 11 languages in California, the Hmong in Minnesota, and Spanish speaking adults in Arizona. She cited “Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities,” which are the real challenges faced by ELL students, beyond just learning a new language. Judi shared some stories of immigrant communities continuing their cultural norms while in the United States.



Member **Paula Kulina** shared her genealogical research into her grandfather Harry Peary. She pieced together his colorful life, which started as Philip Shafer, by consulting military records, census records, and his death certificate available through Ancestry.com. She contacted the U.S. Navy and obtained his full personnel file, which hinted at the reason behind his name change.

AAUW Arizona News

On Saturday, November 1, five AAUW Green Valley branch members travelled to Sun Lakes to participate in the AAUW Arizona Fall Forum 2025. The theme of the Forum "Hands Off Our History and Our Future!" was well-attended with over 80 women from all seven Arizona branches.

The first speaker, Dr. Mary Logan Rothschild, gave a well-researched and captivating account of the history of the women's movement, beginning with its ties to the abolition of slavery movement and continuing through the creation of the National Organization for Women (NOW) and the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), to present-day efforts to undo many of the advances women have made in the last 50 years. As a professor at the University of Washington, Dr. Rothschild formed the Women's Studies department in 1971.

Dr. Melanie Sturgeon spoke about the importance of and need for saving and archiving women's oral histories. As the State Archivist of Arizona for 16 years, she was instrumental in the effort to get a statue of Frances Willard Munds erected in her honor at the Wesley Bolin Memorial Plaza at the Arizona state capital. Munds was president of the Arizona Equal Suffrage Association and was instrumental in obtaining the right to vote for Arizona White women in 1912. (Black and Native American women did not earn the right to vote until the Voting Rights Act of 1965).

Bonnie Boyce-Wilson of the AAUW Northwest Valley Branch spoke about the impact on women and historically underrepresented groups caused by the loss of DEI programs. She urged us to "challenge the narratives driving the backlash [against DEI] and work toward creating workplaces where everyone has the opportunity to thrive." As a side note, Bonnie Boyce-Wilson will be speaking at our February general meeting along with Northwest Valley Branch member Debbie Hansen, about the AAUW Arizona "We Made History!" project.

During lunch, attendees were divided into random groups to brainstorm how to advocate on a variety of topics important to women, including access to healthcare, economic security at work and beyond, higher education, civil rights and DEI, and local schools and school boards.

Six AAUW branch members, including our own branch member Sharon Rezac Andersen, shared first-person stories of their roles in changing the world for women and girls.

The day ended with a panel presentation about how a non-partisan effort to pass HB 2816 in the Arizona legislature was successful through the efforts of two Arizona representatives (one Democrat and one Republican) and advocates for the developmental disabilities program. One of the most powerful speakers was the 14-year-old sister of a boy with severe developmental issues who told us about her successful effort to arrange a meeting with a legislator who opposed the bill. It was a good lesson in bi-partisan advocacy. Jodi Liggett, founder of Arizona Center for Women's Advancement, introduced the panel by saying, "Honestly, this episode will be taught in future policy seminars and political science courses."


