## January Meeting Recap

We had 56 members and 10 guests at our January 20 general meeting. We suspect some of these additional guests attended through our promotional efforts in GV News and across social media. It was quite a crowd!



Our speaker was Alex La Pierre, co-founder of Borderlandia, a bi-national organization committed to building public understanding of the borderlands. With a recent background in the nonprofit field in Ambos Nogales and in citizen diplomacy in the borderlands, Alex originally arrived in southern Arizona working for the National Park Service in the fields of historic preservation and heritage interpretation. A graduate of the University of Arizona, an award-winning documentary filmmaker, and a public historian, his studies focus on the Hispanic cultural heritage of the American Southwest and Mexico.

### **Alex La Pierre**

Alex's talk "Beef, Wheat, and Chiltepín: Sonora's Culinary Heritage" focused on the culture and history of the Sonora state of Mexico and how its culinary history came to Arizona. Missionaries, sent from Spain, followed the rivers north from Mexico into the United States. They brought with them Spanish culinary influences such as livestock, chickpeas, quince, lentils and wheat, and the Moorish influence in Spain included sugar cane and rice. The indigenous populations in Mexico wanted what the Spanish missionaries brought to the New World, but those Spanish influences stayed mostly in northern Mexico.

He started with the explanation of "carne seca," which is what we call beef jerky and how the Sonorans dried their beef to preserve it. Then came "carne asada," which is what we call beef barbecue. Given the climate in Sonora, the indigenous benefitted from two wheat crops per year, which contributed to the introduction of flour tortillas and coyotas. A coyota is a traditional Sonoran dessert made of flour, sugar, and milk. Alex likened them to "Sonoran Pop-Tarts." Chiltepín is considered the wild ancestor of all modern chilis and is native to the borderlands. It is commonly eaten fresh and green, pickled, or dried and red. Tumacácori is home to the only wild chili botanical area in the United States protecting this plant. Membrillo is another Spanish influence made by adding sugar to quince fruit and forming it into a paste.

Alex also mentioned the common beverages found in Sonora: saguaro and organ pipe cactus wine, bacanora which is a liquor made from the agave plant, lechuguilla which is a fermented agave drink, and vino de tapiro which is elderberry wine.



### Keeping Girls in School



AAUW mission advances gender equity for all women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. In order for all girls, regardless of financial status, to realize their full potential, they need to take advantage of educational opportunities.

The \$500 Community Action Grant that our branch received has enabled girls in 5<sup>th</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> grade in Continental School stay in school during the time they need feminine hygiene products. This grant enabled the **Keeping Girls in School** committee to gift the school a total of 1,204 Kotex Teen and Kotex Lite sanitary pads, 96 panties in various sizes and various brands, and 900 PDI Sani-Hands sanitary wipes.

Maureen Swartzentruber, Continental School nurse, and I keep in touch if more products are needed. When you bring products to our monthly meeting or make a monetary donation, our committee is able to purchase more items and distribute them to the school and our community effort. The community effort includes the needs of the Tohono O'odham Nation Reservation and both local food banks. Please help KGIS continue to help the girls in Continental School and the community continue to advance their education by being able to stay in school.


